Swainson's Hawk Migration, Location and Habitat Preservation

Dan Airola and Jude Lamare

Dan Airola will be speaking on a study, partially funded by SAS, of migration and wintering locations of Swainson's Hawks that nest in the greater Sacramento region.

The study members put satellite transmitters on hawks to track their movements during spring and fall migration and to locate and describe wintering areas. They found an unprecedented diversity of wintering areas from western Mexico to central South America, which appears to distinguish the Central Valley population from those residing elsewhere in western North America.

Jude Lamare, PhD and President of Friends of the Swainson's Hawk, will give a brief update on the status of habitat preservation locally along with other current issues. She'll include a power point presentation with nest site maps and photos of nests with young.

Sacramento Audubon meetings are held the third Thursday of the month at the Effie Yeaw Nature Center Assembly Room in Carmichael. The public is welcome. Monterey Bay Pelagic and Coastal Field Trips

Coastal Field Trip Sunday, October 1, 2017

Join Sacramento Audubon for the annual Monterey Bay pelagic trip on Saturday, September 30. Monterey Bay is perhaps one of the most accessible and productive areas to learn about and enjoy pelagic birds and marine mammals. Normally protected from heavy sea swells, yet geographically situated to capture an amazing diversity of ocean-going birds, Monterey Bay and the surrounding area is an exceptional place for birding. On Saturday's boat trip we'll look for shearwaters, albatrosses and other pelagic birds as well as marine mammals. For those staying overnight in Monterey, on Sunday, October 1, we will visit coastal habitats on the Monterey peninsula that may yield many migratory and vagrant surprises. The boat trip will depart Fisherman's Wharf promptly at 7:30am and return about 3:30pm. The boat trip is limited to 25 participants to ensure every one has plenty of room, so send your reservation form and check early to reserve your spot. Note: reservations are not con-

Field Trip Findings

Yuba Pass/Sierra Valley (7/11)—Leader Dan Tankersley reported: “On a lovely summer’s day, eight of us enjoyed the birds and fresh air of Sierra and Plumas counties. The group was actively birding Yuba Pass when the leader arrived. They had already seen as many as 20 Evening Grosbeaks, a half dozen Cassin’s Finch and a White-headed Woodpecker. During the course of the morning, the notable birds we picked up included MacGillivray’s, Wilson’s and Orange-crowned Warblers, Dusky and Hammond’s Flycatchers, a heard Pileated Woodpecker and a fly-by Williamson’s Sapsucker that, unfortunately, not everyone got to see. In the valley we saw Swainson’s Hawk on nest (thanks to Gary Fregien), Sandhill Crane and lots of White-faced Ibis among other waterbirds. In all, we had 75 species for the day with the highlight being spending much time viewing three recently fledged Hammond’s Flycatchers being fed by dotting parents.”

Loney Meadow (7/9) — Leader Scott Hoppe reported: “This was a great escape from the valley heat for 12 participants, and those in the group that had never been to Loney before were impressed by the beauty of the meadows, the wildflowers and, of course, the birds. Highlights included a family of Golden-crowned Kinglets at near eye level, likely the most Macgillivray’s Warblers I have ever seen here and brief but exciting views of Pileated Woodpecker (from the calls, we determined that there were at least 3.) We tallied about 37 species. It was a good group and everyone had a great time, topped off by birthday cake (provided by Wendy Money) for a couple of us turning 39.”

Sailor Bar (7/8) — Leader Darrell Mohr reported: “Seven people decided to enjoy the early morning and avoid the heat. Summertime and birds were scarce. We did find 33 species, which for the time of year and the heat, was very good. Some of the highlights were an Osprey, fledgling Oriole, Spotted Sandpiper, Lesser Goldfinches, Ash-throated Flycatchers, as well as a pair of White-tailed Kites. By the time we returned the outside temperature was going into the 90’s, so we called it a day. Not bad for a hot day.”

Mather Lake (7/2) — Leader Wayne Blunk reported: “With mild weather and a light breeze 13 birders gathered and identified 44 species with a juvenile

Peregrine Falcon as a highlight. The rest of the species were as expected with a Kite chasing a Swainson’s Hawk. Spotting a baby Muskrat and multiple species with offspring rounded out the wonderful outing.”

Point Reyes (7/1) — Leader Dan Williams reported: “12 of us enjoyed a cool, breezy Canada Day on the Point. We started at White House Pool where at least 2 Northern Parulas were buzzing like crazy from the willows near Sir Francis Drake Boulevard. There have been an above average amount of these Eastern warblers in Marin County this summer, and while it was tough to get a good look at them as they sang away from the dense thicket, it was a cool experience nonetheless. We also briefly heard a Macgillivray’s Warbler singing at this location. We then moved on to the Earthquake Trail at Bear Valley where we were treated to many singing Swainson’s Thrushes, Wilson’s Warblers, Warbling Vireos, And Pacific-slope Flycatchers. Pygmy Nuthatches squeaked at us from high in the redwoods, and lo and behold as were driving out to head to the Outer Point we heard yet another Parula. We parked and craned our necks for a while to try to see this guy who was singing high atop a Spanish moss bestrewn bay laurel, but after about 15 minutes we were only afforded fleeting glimpses. We ate lunch at Chimney Rock Trailhead which was gorgeous as always, though the wind made birding pretty tough. We endured it long enough to see dozens of Pacific Loons, Common Murres, and all 3 cormorants as well as the ever-present Elephant Seals, but shortly thereafter we retreated to Drakes Monument. We picked up a couple of birds there, but the highlight from that location was a herd of resting Tule Elk just east of the entrance road. Heading inland, a couple of us caught a glimpse of an adult Bald Eagle flying over Inverness, and at the corner of Novato Boulevard and Point Reyes–Petaluma near the Cheese Factory there was an Osprey tearing apart a fish on a telephone pole.”

Ice House Road (6/30) — Leader Mark Sawyer reported: “The trip went great with 8 participants and 49 species. We also went to Wrights Lake. The highlights were: MacGillivray’s Warbler, Olive Sided Flycatcher, Lazuli Bunting, Thick Billed Fox Sparrow, Cassins, Warbling and Hutton’s Vireos, White-headed Woodpecker, Williamson’s Sapsucker, Pine Grosbeak, Cassin’s Finch, and Mountain Quail—heard only.”

Estates Drive (6/27) — Leader Craig DeMartini reported: “Cool morning temperatures were a pleasant relief after the previous 100+ degree week. Seven inquisitive and alert participants attended our walk along the American River near Estates Drive where we encountered 36 avian species. We got decent looks at perched juvenile Northern Rough-wing swallows showing their buffy wing bars, and a close up view of a fishing Great Blue Heron perched above a small, secluded pond. We stopped to smell the Mugwort, and we discussed how to tell the difference between the Tree of Heaven and the California Black Walnut.”

River Bend Park (6/25) — Leader Dan Brown reported: “In a break from the recent valley heat wave, 9 of us had a very pleasant and birdy outing to River Bend County Park. Highlights of the 36 species seen were a family of 5 Cooper’s Hawks, Ash-throated Flycatcher, Pacific-slope Flycatcher, 2 Hutton’s Vireos and a 2-1/2 foot Pacific Rattlesnake.”

Indian Grinding Rocks SP (6/24) — Leader Cliff Hawley reported: “Three birders joined me for a wonderful morning at Grinding Rocks State Park near Volcano. Since the birds were all busy feeding young the number of birds singing had decreased but a good time was had by all with the butterflies putting on a good show along with the birds. The best birds were Pacific Wren, Chestnut-backed Chickadee, and many Black-headed Grosbeaks.”

Bushy Lake (6/22) — Leader Darrell Mohr reported that he showed up, but no one else did. In spite of the extreme heat there seemed to be quite a few birds.

FRS radios can be helpful on all trips. Starting times are the actual time the trip leaves the meeting place. Try to arrive early, especially if you want driving directions or plan to carpool. Join Dan for an afternoon and evening of birding in the Sierra, ending in an area that at this time of year hosts many Common Nighthawks that can be observed feeding and calling at sunset. Dan has seen up to 50 nighthawks in the air at one time here, which can present great photo opportunities! This spot is about an hour away from Sacramento. We will begin about 1:30pm birding a small private lake, looking for common Sierra birds such as Western Tanager, Black-headed Grosbeak, Spotted Sandpiper, White-headed Woodpecker and possible Osprey and Bald Eagle. Also of interest at this lake are numerous species of dragonflies that we don't see in the Valley. We will then bird our way toward the nighthawk site, stopping for a picnic dinner in the field and ending the day after sunset watching the nighthawks. We will be walking for about 2 miles total, mostly on flat terrain so wear appropriate shoes. Bring a folding chair or two and whatever you would like for our picnic dinner. Also bring water, sunscreen, a hat, a light coat for the evening and MOSQUITO REPELLENT. This trip is limited to 12 participants, so please contact Dan to save a spot and for meeting location/time.

August is a great time to view shorebirds in the Sacramento Valley on migration from their Arctic breeding grounds. Since ideal conditions change depending on water levels, we will visit areas with the best shorebird habitat. This may be in Yolo, Placer, or Sacramento County—or all three. This is a good chance to brush up on the common species and possibly find something unexpected. If you have a spotting scope, bring it, along with water and a snack. Meet at the Park and Ride off I-80 in West Sacramento. From Sacramento, take the West Capitol Ave Exit #81; turn left at the light and then left again into the Park and Ride lot.

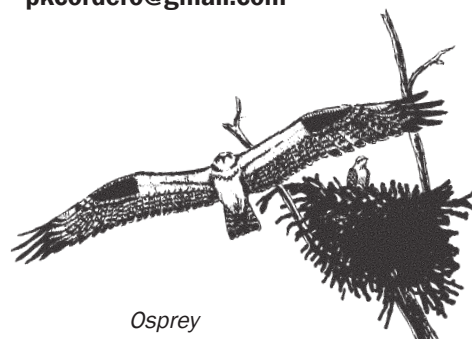

The Bufferlands are 2,500 acres surrounding the wastewater treatment plant between Sacramento and Elk Grove and not typically open to the public. Habitats include riparian forest, seasonal wetlands, grasslands, wildlife-friendly agricultural lands, and many habitat restoration sites. This is a good time of year to look for migrating songbirds. **Be prepared for 3 miles of easy walking.**

New directions: Take I-5 south from Sacramento and exit at Laguna Blvd. Drive east to Franklin Blvd and turn left. Go past the stoplight at Bighorn Blvd and turn left at the next block (Sims Rd—no stoplight) with poplar trees and a brick planter. Drive 0.6 mile and turn right on Laguna

Station Rd. Drive 0.5 mile and turn left at Glacier Way before reaching the guard station (If using GPS, enter Glacier Way, Elk Grove, CA 95758). Drive 0.25 mile to the Bufferlands office entrance at the end of Glacier Way. A large gate will be open and the front glass doors will be unlocked.

Highlights included a Cooper's Hawk on nest, Swainson's Hawk, White-tailed Kite, Green Heron, Northern Rough-winged Swallow and the biggest surprise was a singing Yellow-breasted Chat."

Yuba Gap Family Trip (6/17) — Leaders Sandra Steurer and Wendy Money reported: "12 participants joined the two leaders for a cool birding experience on a day when the valley was sizzling. We had birds vocalizing throughout the late afternoon/evening. Our count was 31 bird species. At the pond (where we never know what will turn up), we were treated to a family of young Buffleheads, a fledgling Kestrel, four species of warbler, families of camera-ready Tree Swallows, Rufous-crowned Sparrow, and many singing Fox Sparrows. At our dinner spot, we observed frolicking Western Tanagers, Olive-Sided Flycatcher, families of White-Headed Woodpeckers, and entertaining Mountain Chickadees. To add to our delight, two Ospreys were spotted over the pond. The entire time, Mountain Quail were calling from the chaparral, even during the fly-out of the low-flying Common Nighthawks, whose flight patterns were mesmerizing. Our wonderful reptile sighting was a Rubber Boa on the trail at dusk."
