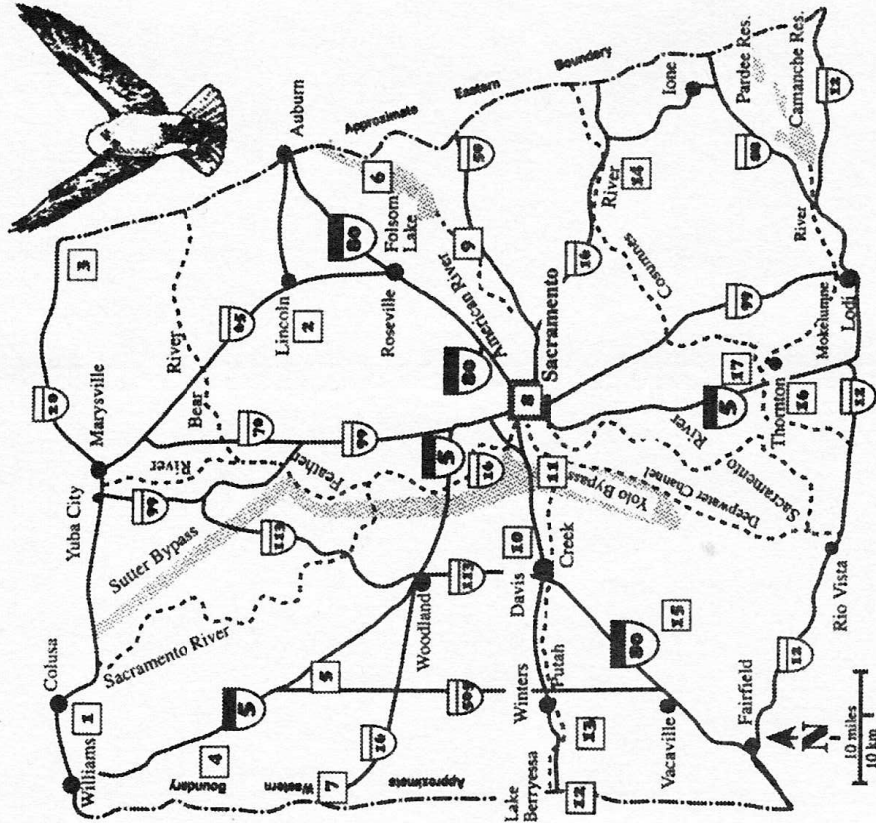

INTRODUCTION

Situated at the confluence of two major rivers, Sacramento offers riparian woodland, marshes and vast areas of agricultural land in the surrounding valley. In the foothills to the east and west are extensive grasslands, chaparral and oak woodlands. This variety of habitats, together with mild winters, makes the Sacramento area one of North America's outstanding inland birding areas in terms of both species richness and total number of birds.

The area covered by this list extends from State Highway 12 on the south to State Highway 20 on the north, and to the 1000' contour in the foothills on both sides of the Valley.

This list contains information on the relative abundance and seasonal occurrence of 255 species which might reasonably be found in appropriate habitat. In addition, 31 species are included which are very rare, but have been recorded on multiple occasions, with some nearly annual. Many other species have been seen in this checklist area, but are not listed here since there are 10 or fewer records of occurrence.

Species names and listed order follow the *American Ornithologists' Union's Checklist of North American Birds, 7th edition*, including subsequent supplements. For additional information on abundance and seasonal occurrence of species within the Sacramento Checklist Area, please refer to the *Checklist of the Birds of Yolo County, California (Rev. 4/04)*, and *A Field Checklist for Birds of the Cosumnes River Preserve, Sacramento County, California (Third Revision-2001)*.
